WHEREAS, the FY 2013 – FY 2016 TIP had undergone appropriate review by the Council and was considered at a public meeting on November 27, 2012, and consistent with the requirements of the Adopted Public Participation Plan a 15-day public comment period had been instituted; and

WHEREAS, on November 27, 2012, the S/W MPO Council adopted the FY 2013 – FY 2016 Transportation Improvement Program for the S/W MPO Area in accordance with the Organization's Public Participation Plan; and

WHEREAS, the proposed amendments to the FY 2013 – FY 2016 TIP, Revision 1, have undergone appropriate review by the S/W MPO Council and were considered at a public meeting on May 9, 2013, and consistent with the requirements of the Organization's Adopted Public Participation Plan a 15-day comment period was instituted; and


WHEREAS, the FY 2013 – FY 2016 TIP, Revision 2 has been modified to include the following Amendments: 1) Add STIP# SW12_CAP_2 in the total amount of \$250,000; 2) Add STIP # SW12_OP_2 in the total amount of \$186,000; and 3) Add STIP# SW12_OP_3 in the total amount of \$39,000; and

INTRODUCTION

As a result of the 2000 U.S. Census, the Salisbury area has been classified as an Urbanized area and in accordance with the U.S. Department of Transportation requirements, a Metropolitan Planning Organization was designated by Maryland Governor Robert L. Ehrlich on February 19, 2004. The Salisbury/Wicomico Metropolitan Planning Organization (S/W MPO) includes the City of Salisbury, the City of Fruitland, the Town of Delmar (Md. & De.), and the adjacent unincorporated areas of Wicomico County, Md., and Sussex County, De. The planning area boundary is a larger area that includes the anticipated growth area for the next 20 years for the member jurisdictions.

The population of the new urbanized area as defined by the U.S. Census Bureau was 59,426 with 57,986 persons residing in Maryland (97.6%) and 1,440 persons residing in Delaware (2.4%), as of the 2010 Census. A population of 50,000 or greater is required for designation of an urbanized area.

Since the 1960's the federal government has established urban transportation planning requirements in all metropolitan areas, as a prerequisite to the approval of federal funding (23 CFR Part 450 and 49 CFR Part 613). The regulations require a continuing, comprehensive and cooperative (3-C) planning process in all urbanized areas. The S/W MPO is the planning agency responsible for transportation planning within the identified planning area in accordance with federal regulations.

In 1991, the Intermodal Surface Transportation Efficiency Act (ISTEA) was passed. This act revised some of the established regulations and procedures and placed a new emphasis on Metropolitan Planning Organizations. As part of this Act the MPO planning process has been more specifically defined and new planning requirements have been prescribed.

In 1998, the Transportation Equity Act for the 21st Century (TEA-21) was passed continuing the initiatives of the 1991 Act and adding several new provisions and programs.

In 2005, the Safe, Accountable, Flexible, Efficient Transportation Equity Act: A Legacy for Users (SAFETEA-LU) was passed, building on the foundation established by ISTEA and TEA-21 and representing the largest surface transportation investment in the Nation's history. Whereas previous legislation identified seven distinct areas which MPOs and the states should consider when developing plans, SAFETEA-LU added emphasis in two areas: security and the environment. Transportation security is now a separate planning factor, indicating its importance in comparison to previous legislation, and the factor relating to the environment has been expanded, in order to promote consistency of the long-range transportation plan with planned growth and development. The SAFETEA-LU Mandated Planning Factors are as follows:

- (1) Support the economic vitality of the metropolitan area, especially by enabling global competitiveness, productivity, and efficiency;
- (2) Increase the safety of the transportation system for motorized and nonmotorized users;
- (3) Increase the security of the transportation system for motorized and nonmotorized users;
- (4) Increase the accessibility and mobility of people and for freight;
- (5) Protect and enhance the environment, promote energy conservation, improve the quality of life, and promote consistency between transportation improvements and State and local planned growth and economic development patterns;

- (6) Enhance the integration and connectivity of the transportation system, across and between modes, for people and freight;
- (7) Promote efficient system management and operation; and
- (8) Emphasize the preservation of the existing transportation system.

This Transportation Improvement Program (TIP), which is a component of the prescribed Metropolitan Planning Process, is a compendium of all federally-funded and regionally significant transportation projects that have been programmed for a four-year period for the Salisbury Urbanized Area. This TIP was available for review and comment by the public consistent with the Organization's Public Participation Program and has been approved by the Salisbury – Wicomico Metropolitan Planning Organization Council.

Organization and Management

Metropolitan Planning Organization

The S/W MPO was designated by Maryland Governor Robert L. Ehrlich on February 19, 2004, and is the primary agency responsible for transportation planning within the MPO's Planning Area.

The primary governing body of the S/W MPO is the Council, which consists of eleven (11) members, nine (9) of which are voting members and two are non-voting members. The voting members consist of representatives from the following governments and agencies:

- Maryland Department of Transportation
- Wicomico County (3 positions)
- City of Salisbury (2 positions)
- City of Fruitland
- Town of Delmar, MD
- Tri-County Council for the Lower Eastern Shore of MD

The non-voting membership of the S/W MPO consists of 2 members representing the Delaware Department of Transportation and the Town of Delmar, DE.

Technical Advisory Committee (TAC)

The S/W MPO Council has established a Technical Advisory Committee (TAC) comprised of technical representatives such as planners and engineers to provide technical expertise and develop recommendations to assist the Council by reviewing and recommending revisions to the planning process, data collection, forecasts, the Long-Range Transportation Plan, the Transportation Improvement Program and the Unified Planning Work Program. The current TAC voting membership includes representation from the various member jurisdictions, as well as from transportation organizations and relevant state agencies. The TAC includes representation from all modes of transportation in addition to various levels of government, and this provides the opportunity to achieve a unified transportation planning effort.

MPO Staff

The S/W MPO Staff consists of personnel from the Salisbury-Wicomico Department of Planning, Zoning and Community Development. At this time, Staff devotes a portion of its time to MPO activities and is not full-time. The Staff manages the operations of the MPO as directed by the Council and recommendations of the TAC, and coordinates all planning projects and activities identified by the Council. The Staff also acts as a local liaison to the State and Federal agencies involved in transportation planning within the MPO.

Organizational Procedures and Bylaws

The MPO operates under an adopted set of bylaws. Wicomico County provides support services to the MPO, including legal, financial and purchasing services, and staff performing these services operates under the rules and procedures of the County and the State of Maryland. The MPO's official records are maintained in the Salisbury-Wicomico Department of Planning, Zoning and Community Development's offices in Room 203 of the Government Office Building, North Division Street and U.S. Route 50, Salisbury, MD, 21803. The MPO records are available for public inspection during normal business hours, Monday through Friday, 8 a.m. to 5 p.m.

PUBLIC PARTICIPATION PROCESS

The Salisbury/Wicomico Metropolitan Planning Organization Council is the policy body for transportation planning in the Metropolitan Area and meets as needed to conduct MPO business such as approval of the annual Unified Planning Work Program (UPWP) and the Transportation Improvement Program (TIP). The Council also acts to amend these documents as necessary. The Council meetings are advertised on the S/WMPO website, in the local newspaper and are open to the public. Opportunities for the public to comment on MPO issues are provided at the meetings. The MPO Council held a public hearing on the FY 2013-2016 TIP at their meeting on November 27, 2012 to receive comments from opponents and proponents of the Plan. At which time, the MPO Council adopted the FY 2013 – 2016 TIP. As a result of proposed amendments, the MPO Council conducted a public hearing on May 9, 2013 to review and approve the FY 2013 – 2016 TIP (Revision #1) as amended. At which time, the MPO Council unanimously adopted the amended FY 2013 – 2016 TIP, Revision #1. Revision #2 of the FY 2013 – FY 2016 TIP was reviewed and unanimously adopted by the MPO Council on June 19, 2013.

In compliance with SAFETEA-LU and as part of the FY 2008 UPWP, a Public Participation Plan has been developed and was adopted in June 2008. This Plan documents and formalizes the public participation process, which is conducted for all MPO activities including the development, review and approval of the TIP. Specifically, the Plan requires a 15-day public comment period for the TIP, which includes amendments. Moreover, the Plan requires a Public Hearing of the MPO Council, as well as advertising notice of the Public Hearing in the Daily Times and the Organization's website (swmpo.org) 14-days prior to any action.

PROJECT PRIORITIZATION

Maryland's small MPO's, which are staffed by County Planning Offices, do not have formally defined project prioritization processes. The MPO's do however have a role in the development of the Maryland Consolidated Transportation Program (CTP) which contains all of the projects programmed in the Metropolitan Transportation Improvement Programs.

In addition to the frequent and in some cases daily coordination and consultation between MPO staff and MDOT planners, there are several mechanisms for reaching consensus on the programming of local transportation projects as follows:

- **Maryland Association of Counties & Maryland Municipal League:** These two organizations meet annually and provide both formal and informal opportunities for local elected officials and County representatives in the State to share and discuss transportation needs. MPO policy body members are members of these groups.
- **Secondary Program Priority Letter:** State and local elected officials are encouraged to reach consensus on local priorities for the secondary highway system and to document these priorities in a letter to the State Highway Administration. The priorities become candidates for funding and inclusion in the CTP.
- **Annual Consolidated Transportation Program (CTP) Tour:** In the Fall of every year the Secretary of Transportation and the Department's modal administrators visit each of the State's 23 counties and Baltimore City to present and solicit input on the Draft CTP from local elected officials, state legislators and citizens. Information obtained at these meetings is used in the development of the final CTP that is presented to the General Assembly for approval at the beginning of the 90-day legislative session in January. Since County elected officials are members of all of Maryland's small MPO policy boards, the MPOs are represented and consulted during the annual CTP Tour.



